MIRRORING

Mirror neurons enable listeners to mirror experience

CORTICAL ACTIVITY

Two areas of the brain are activated when processing facts. Stories activate many additional areas such as the motor cortex, sensory cortex and frontal cortex.



DOPAMINE

The brain releases dopamine in response to an emotionally-charged event, resolution of conflict, or even recognition of a pattern, creating a pleasurable response and ease of memory and recall

CORTISOL

The brain releases cortisol when it experiences conflict which increases attention and memory

OXYTOCIN

The brain releases oxytocin in response to characters that increases empathy and connection as well as compassion and trust

It argues that narratives are the natural mode of thinking, that the urge to think narratively reflects known neurological processes, and that although narrative thinking is a product of evolution, it enables us to transcend our evolutionary limits and actively shape our own futures. Executive function refers to the goal-oriented regulation of one's own thoughts, actions, and emotions. Its importance is attested by its contribution to the development of other cognitive skills, e.g., theory of mind, social abilities, e.g., peer interactions, and academic achievement, e.g., mathematics, and by the consequences of deficits in executive function which are observed in a wide range of developmental disorders such as attention deficit hyperactivity disorder and autism. Over the last decade, there has been growing interest in the development of executive function, and an expanding body of research has shown that executive function develops rapidly during the preschool years, with adult-level performance being achieved during adolescence or later. Edelman's Neural Darwinism informs Barry's investigation of the psychoanalytic theory of internalization and Fajardo's reassessment of breaks in consciousness whereas Gedo's hierarchical model of mental functioning informs Fisher's presentation of the treatment of an autistic child.
