

Te Reo Māori Pronunciation Guide

There are 15 distinct sounds within the Māori alphabet. They are:

• five vowels: a, e, i, o, u

• eight consonants: h, k, m, n, p, r, t, w

• two digraphs (two letters that combine to form one sound): wh, ng

A vowel can also have a long or short sound. A long sound usually has a macron (a bar over a vowel to indicate it is lengthened during pronunciation, e.g. 'ā' as in wāhi). Most constants are pronounced the same as in English, except 'y' and 'r'.

The 'wh' digraph originally sounded like the 'wh' in 'whisper', but in most dialects has evolved to be more like the English 'f' sound.

The 'ng' digraph is pronounced as it sounds in the English word 'singer'.

The 'y' sound varies depending on which vowel comes after it. When followed by an 'a', 'e' or 'i', it's pronounced with little or no 'y' sound.

When followed by an 'o' or 'u', it includes a slight 'y' sound, however not nearly as much as an English 'y'.

The 'r' sound is pronounced as a soft 'rolled r' similar to the 'r' sound in English.

Orsman,1989 **Let's Learn Maori** Bruce Biggs,1998 This work comprises a textbook and self help guide to the study of the Maori language It is also a complete grammar reference covering parts of speech the structure of each type of phrase and the combinations of phrases that form simple sentences Publisher s description **Beginner's Guide To Māori Phrases** Leighton Rylant,2025-08-09 The M ori people the indigenous Polynesian inhabitants of New Zealand speak M ori as their native language It is one of the official languages of New Zealand in addition to English and New Zealand Sign Language Te reo M ori or M ori is a significant component of New Zealand s identity and has a complex cultural and historical significance Key Features of M ori Language Phonetics M ori has a relatively simple phonetic system compared to many European languages It contains 15 letters in total five vowels a e i o u and ten consonants h k m n ng p r s t w Vowel Sounds Vowels are crucial in M ori because each one can have a short or long sound which can change the meaning of words Long vowels are represented with a macron Pronunciation M ori pronunciation is fairly straightforward once you get the hang of it as the language is phonetic For example wh is pronounced like an English f e g wh nau family Word Structure M ori is an agglutinative language meaning that it often uses prefixes and suffixes to modify the meaning of words This structure can make sentences look a bit longer than their English counterparts Articles M ori has a system of definite and indefinite articles similar to the and a in English Te the for singular definite nouns He a for singular indefinite nouns Ng the for plural definite nouns Sentence Structure The typical sentence order in M ori is VSO Verb Subject Object This is different from English which generally follows a Subject Verb Object SVO order For example I eat an apple in M ori would be Ka kai au i te poro Cultural Context M ori is deeply intertwined with the culture traditions and worldview of the M ori people Many M ori words phrases and concepts cannot be fully understood outside of this context This makes learning the language not just about the words themselves but also about the culture behind them Examples of Basic Phrases in M ori Haere mai

Welcome T n koe Hello to one person Kei te p hea koe How are you Ng mihi Thank you Aroha mai Sorry E noho r Goodbye when someone is leaving Haere r Goodbye when you are leaving Language Revival Efforts While M ori was once on the brink of extinction there has been a concerted effort since the 1980s to revitalize the language These efforts include the establishment of M ori language schools immersion programs Kura Kaupapa M ori and the use of M ori in media such as television and radio The M ori Language Commission established in 1987 works to promote and protect the language M ori is a language of whakapapa genealogy The M ori language places a strong emphasis on family connections ancestry and the relationship between people and the land sea and sky *A Dictionary of Maori Words in New Zealand English* John Macalister, 2005 New Zealand possesses a relatively young and certainly vibrant variety of English The influence of te reo Maori makes a significant contribution to that lexical vitality Maori words began to enter English in 1769 after the arrival of James Cook and H M S Endeavour They continue to do so today with an estimated six words out of every thousand in written and spoken New Zealand English being of Maori origin These words include the names of flora and fauna aspects of material and social culture and new creations as well as place and personal names This dictionary presents a comprehensive picture of that presence in New Zealand English and provides a vignette of New Zealand society through the citation accompanying many of the words
